- 3. Canadian Quilters Association Project Walk to Brock the distance will be measured by the circumference of each finished project in the guild. Each week during Show and Tell we will record the circumference of finished projects and submit.

- 4. *Ageless NB* Theresa has included an article about the quilt show and our octogenarians in the fall issue.
- 5. Dooryard Festival The Quilt Guild participated in Woodstock's annual Dooryard Festival at a cost of \$20. It was a fun social event that raised awareness of the guild. There are plans to participate again next year.
- 6. Guild Directory new members encouraged to have their photo taken tonight and fill out the form so we can update the Directory.

Committee Reports

<u>Super Saturday</u> – September 21, 9-3; two projects will be available to do – an embroidered tea towel and a miniature pumpkin wall hanging. Members are encouraged to sign up tonight if they plan to attend. A supply list is available. Cost is \$5 to attend.

<u>Community Quilts</u> – couple of comfort quilts were given out over the summer – Joe McGuire, Paul Bragdon; 8 bags were taken to River Valley Cancer Support Group; several kits for quilts are available for members to make up.

<u>Instructors</u> – Karen Henry from Halifax, Oct 24-26 will be teaching pictorial quilts. Cost is \$20 for guild members. Thursday night will be a trunk show which will be free to members, and \$5 for non-members.

The plan is to host Karen in a hotel, unless someone volunteers to host in a home.

Erica Hull, a yoga instructor, will be here at October meeting to teach some relaxation techniques.

Report from Library Committee, Summer 2013
---Chair: Shelley Dionne

Show & Tell - Members showed various items they had completed over the summer.

Fabric Draw – 2 prizes – winners were: Shirley Dumphrey and Suzanne Hunter.

Program – Olivia and Debra Flewelling are new program coordinators.

- 1. The Great Idiom Challenge was presented.
 An idiom is a combination of words that has a figurative meaning. The challenge is to express in fabric the idiom you draw.
 Projects will be shown at the January meeting. Judging will be based on creative interpretation.
- 2. Debra's Discovery #1 A handout about motif machine quilting with a stencil was passed out and the method reviewed. This method doesn't have to be marked on the quilt. Quilting paper/onion skin paper/tracing paper can be used. Challenge for October's meeting: bring a square with a motif done and your name goes in for a prize draw.

First, I would bring to everyone's attention that there is NO MORE SPACE in our library cabinet. The shelves are full to capacity now and already curving down in the center from the weight of the books. The shelves themselves are not bolted or screwed to the cabinet.

They just hook into place at the sides in such a way that so to add more weight is going to cause them to collapse because the ends where they hook in will flip up out of place.

First, I will give you an accounting of what is in the cabinet as far as library is concerned and then I will give you the Library committee's recommendations.

Books: 192(approx.) including duplicate and triplicate copies of some. We did our best, I don't think we missed any but you never know © There are six books that have a duplicate copy and one book that we have three copies of. That makes 8 duplicate copies.

Individual Patterns: 50, 85% of which have never been signed out. They are now organized in a binder and will be put out each month.

Magazines: 24 (approx.)complete magazines...we went thru and pulled any magazine that had missing pages/patterns (set aside for now)
Several binders containing info from Gathering of the Guilds, Past Guild Newsletters, and supplies for library take up the entire complete top shelf.

We have 18 books that have never, ever been signed out (this does not include newly acquired ones). We have 16 books that have not been signed out since 2009.

Unfortunately, it has become necessary to remove some media from the library. It would be wonderful if we had room to keep it all, forever, but that is not an option.

The Library Committee recognizes and understands the value of the contents in our library. We, also, understand and appreciate the sentiments that guild members may have concerning books. We appreciate all donations made over the past years. We welcome offers of donations. We recognize that all books have value to someone whether the information they provide is old or new. Please understand that we are not recommending a large slash and removal of books from the library. We would be removing what is necessary to make it possible to free up space to accommodate new books. It is the goal of the Library Committee to always keep and provide books for our members that is

up-to-date in quilting methods, styles, techniques, theory, ideas and patterns.

At this time, the Library Committee proposes the following:

Recommendations:

- 1. Remove duplicate copies of books from library.
- 2. Remove any books from library that meet one or all of the following criteria:
 - Outdated in quilting style or techniques used(a book that contains outdated styles/techniques and is being consistently signed out will be kept)
 - b. Has not been signed out for over 5 years.
 - c. Are not quilt related books
 - d. Has been in the library for more than two years and NEVER been signed out
- 3. Discuss if it is necessary to keep binders containing old copies of guild newsletter, prewebsite newsletters. Most all necessary guild information, that is- information required for the proper running of the guild, would also be recorded in guild minutes and/or registrars book. The registrar's book contains our guild history. At one time it was the responsibility of either the registrar or librarian to make sure one paper copy of the guild newsletter was kept for permanent records. I am not sure if this has been a continued practice in the past few years or not, especially after the guild website was opened.
- 4. Remove from library any magazines with missing pages or patterns.
- 5. Keep no more than 20 magazines in the library at one time, always keeping the most recent-these accumulate fast and take up a lot of space. Old ones offered to guild free of charge in they were donated or by ticket draw if they came from a guild paid subscription.
- 6. Keep only two years' worth, 8 copies, of the Canadian Quilter Associations magazine in library at one time. As the third year starts, the oldest set would be bundled and members who were interested in having them would enter into a draw for them.
- The books/patterns are offered first to guild members for sale either thru pricing or ticket draws. Any books donated would be first offered back to the donor. All monies received

- from sales would be added to library funds, not general guild funds, for the purchase of new books for the library.
- 8. All magazines that were pulled because of missing pages, etc. are offered free to guild members.
- All current Library Committees maintain, in one book, an up to date listing of media in the guild library that states the following: (note, this book has been set-up and would only need maintaining)
 - a. Book title
 - b. Author
 - c. Year published

- d. Type-ex. Piecing, applique
- e. Date acquired by library
- f. Cost of purchase or donated by whom
- 10. Every year end, current Library Committees reviews contents of library, sort and remove old items using criteria mentioned above.

If anyone has concerns or issues with the Library Committee's recommendations, would you mind emailing either myself, Shelley or Susan, President, prior to the meeting night.
